

Laith Marouf: Israel Pushes to Litani River — Hezbollah Ready for Ground War

Hi, everybody. Today is Wednesday, March 25th, 2026, and our dear friend, our brother Laith Marouf, is here with us. Welcome back, Laith.

#Laith

Great to be with you, Nima.

#Nima

Laith, let's start with the conflict—the war in Lebanon. We've learned that the Israelis are moving toward the Litani River. They say the new border of Israel is the Litani River, and they want to make a buffer zone, a security zone—that's what they're talking about. So, what is happening? What's the current situation in Lebanon? I'm talking basically about Hezbollah and Israel.

#Laith

Well, obviously, the Israelis have a lot of fantasies. One of those fantasies, of course, is that they are the chosen people. Another is that they have the right to ethnically cleanse and take anybody's land. Those fantasies don't actually match the reality on the ground. The Zionists, for now—close to 23 days in South Lebanon—have been attempting to enter and reach the Litani. They keep announcing their operations as if they're new, when in reality they haven't been able to hold a single village in the south of Lebanon. Look, the whole strip along the border, from the far east to the far west of South Lebanon, was destroyed during the 66-day war and the so-called ceasefire period, when the Israelis demolished all the buildings there.

And although they did this—burning all the natural cover, the forests around those villages—they still can't hold ground or advance. There's a region in the eastern part of South Lebanon where the Hula Valley stretches north from Palestine, and the border there is just six or seven kilometers from the Litani River. This is the narrowest point where the Litani is closest to Palestine. Until today, the Zionists have been unable to reach that part of the river. That's around the Khayyam area and the Kfar Qila area, and so far they've lost 32 tanks in battles there—in that region, the central part of the border, as well as the western region, where they started operations in the last few days.

Just now, the advancing Zionist forces in South Lebanon have been trying to avoid the villages, and they're coming under heavy bombardment by Katyusha missiles, other rockets, guided missiles, and drone waves. About an hour ago—or even less than that, maybe twenty minutes before we went on air—their advancing forces were attacked. Now helicopters are trying to pull them out. This is from the central region of the border. They're also losing more troops right now as they try to recover their dead and wounded. This has happened over and over. The gathering line of Israeli forces in the north of occupied Palestine has also come under intense fire, and they're reporting around sixty casualties.

Operations a day—this is huge. And added to that, the Iranian armed forces have been firing waves of ballistic missiles over the last 48 hours at the same gathering points of the Israeli forces in the north of Palestine, so they've suffered huge losses. Also, just ten minutes ago, Hezbollah announced that they attacked the Miron base, which is the main command and control hub for the Israeli air forces in the north of Palestine. This is above and beyond the destruction of the vast majority of radars and communication installations in the north of Palestine over the last two days.

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Laith, how do you see the possibility of Israel bringing a lot of forces on the ground to invade Lebanon from the south and push further? And how prepared is Hezbollah for that?

You know, the last wave of Iranian missiles, announced before we came on air, was directed at the Israeli forces gathering on the border of Lebanon, as well as around the Gaza envelope. This is a huge development. It shows that right now Iran has full control over the airspace of the Zionist colony and has the ability to inflict heavy losses on its ground forces. Now that the Iranian systems have destroyed and blinded the Zionist forces—through the destruction of most of their radars, announced just about half an hour ago—the Iranian forces also said they destroyed the radar installations in the two main U.S. occupation bases inside Jordan, as well as in the south of Palestine.

Right now, the Americans have no control—and the Zionists as well—no control over the airspace of the colony, and they're getting pounded beyond just the strategic objectives that Iran wants to destroy. They're also hitting the ground forces of the Zionist colony. There are huge shortages in Israel for parts. Remember, the Israelis' tanks, the Merkavas, are not really made in Israel. Practically everything inside a Merkava is made somewhere else—in Germany, in Italy, in the United States. Only the metal sidings and so forth are made in the Zionist colony. It's like an assembly line.

And as we saw yesterday, there was a shipment of metals and other materials going to the Zionist colony, and not one Mediterranean European state allowed it to dock, because they see it as support for the Zionists' efforts to produce these tanks when they're running very low on them. We heard

that Egypt is allowing this ship to dock on its way to the Zionist colony. I don't know what's going to happen with it—that's another story. I don't know, with the pressure building up on the Egyptian government, what it will do. Will it continue allowing it to dock? Ultimately, the Israelis are running out of air defenses; they're running out of missiles. In fact, they've been dropping missiles that were meant to be used against Egypt after the 1973 war.

These are missiles that are duds—like 50-year-old ones that don't have any guidance. The explosion or detonation failure rate on them is around 30%. Many of the missiles falling on Lebanon and Iran right now aren't even blowing up. That shows how desperate the situation is for the Zionists' supply chain, whether it's their air defenses or their missiles. And finally, we shouldn't underestimate the strain being put on the air forces of the Americans and the Zionists, running nonstop air raids like we're seeing. Most of these jets should be out of service for at least a day, but with these long rotations, it means at least one-third of their air force is now out of service for a long time. There are going to be serious problems for them maintaining this rate of air raids on Lebanon and Iran.

There's a report showing that one of the Israeli officials suggested purchasing Greek islands for the Jewish people during the war. It seems they're getting into a situation where it's very difficult to sustain the conditions they're facing right now. It looks like everything is just—well, they're having a lot of problems in Israel. The market isn't working, people are always in shelters, and the government—everything—is under pressure. They're getting hit by Iranian missiles on one hand, and on the other hand, Hezbollah is attacking them. So what's your understanding of the calculation on the part of the Israelis? What do we know about what's going on internally in Israel today?

Yeah, I mean, there's a lot of blackout of information. There are two reasons, by the way, that we're not seeing many videos coming out from the destruction in the Zionist colony. Obviously, there's censorship and threats of jailing. But the other reason is that most Israeli cities right now are actually empty. A huge number of Israelis have left, not only by planes but also by boats to the Greek islands and to Cyprus. My friends who live in Greece are telling me they've never seen this many Israelis in their towns the whole time they've been living there. Of course, there's already been an increase in the presence of Israelis in Cyprus and Greece since the beginning of October 7, 2023, but now the streets are flooded with them. It's such a noticeable increase that people in these towns and on the Greek islands feel like they're becoming a minority in their own land.

That means, you know, a huge percentage of the colonists have already left for these locations, if not also to the west, where they're less noticeable. So yeah, this is why we see them taking these ferries. Some of these ferries are even meant for cars, but they're packing them in and fighting to get on. So this is one of the reasons we're not seeing many videos coming from inside. The other thing we should note is that both Hezbollah and Iran have been destroying the industrial base of the

Zionist colony, especially over the last week. Just hours ago, Hezbollah announced hitting Kiryat, which is the industrial zone north of Haifa. And we saw just half an hour ago Iran announcing that it hit Arad and the Emuna areas. These are the scientific core of the nuclear program.

So we're talking about tens of thousands of scientists, engineers, and managers of these projects who are all out of jobs and leaving. Their homes and savings are being destroyed, especially because Iran is using submunition missiles that are falling on these areas and destroying a huge number of buildings—above and beyond, of course, the destruction of the Zionist oil and gas plants. Yeah, that was Dimona. That was the offices for the scientists, and the Israelis admitted six of their top scientists were killed. Most probably there are more. If they were hitting their homes, as has happened in Arad and Dimona, the Iranians were targeting the homes of these scientists as retaliation for how the Israelis assassinate scientists. There must be a lot more killed in these important projects of the Zionists.

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Laith, I think what's going on, in combination with what's happening in Iraq, is significant because the United States spent 20 years cooperating with the Iraqi army. Right now, they're fighting each other in Iraq. That shows how serious the situation is there. The resistance in Iraq is literally just pushing them out of the country. What's your understanding of Iraq right now?

Yeah, this is a huge, huge change. Of course, the government right now under Prime Minister Soudani is not the most radical pro-resistance government. But imagine the stupidity of the Americans—attacking an official Ministry of Defense barracks with the military there and killing 13 officers and soldiers. You know, he had no choice as prime minister but to bow to the pressure from the military and security apparatuses of Iraq. There was a National Security Council meeting that authorized the Iraqi military forces, in all their formations, to defend the country and respond to any attack from anywhere against the territory of Iraq and its military forces.

And we saw, within hours, huge bombardments—waves hitting the last remaining American and Zionist presence in Iraq, in what's called Iraqi Kurdistan, around the Erbil city area, wave after wave. You know, the United States had begged to have its forces in the south and east of Iraq leave, and they were allowed, and these were the last ones. And just hours ago, the prime minister and the minister of foreign affairs of Iraq sent a letter summoning the U.S. ambassador to deliver the message. So this is a huge change. For the first time, Iraq—except for the collaborationist region of Kurdistan—has been liberated from all foreign presence on its territory. This is huge.

And to see the Iraqi military or the resistance formations in Iraq now having the backing of the government—to be able to, let's say, shoot down American or Israeli aircraft that may violate Iraq's airspace—although Iraq doesn't have air defenses in the traditional sense, we saw how it's possible

to use long-range, shoulder-mounted missiles to take out those refueling jets. And even if you're not able to take out the fighter jets, those refueling jets are necessary to fly over the regions of Iraq to help the attacking jets refuel on their way back. Otherwise, they'll fall in the middle of the desert. And that's why what we're seeing right now is very significant. And I want to say something, probably before we move from Lebanon.

This is as significant as the story we just heard about the United States ambassador in Baghdad. In Lebanon, the collaborationist foreign minister, who comes from the fascist Christian supremacist party, ordered the expulsion of the ambassador of the Islamic Republic of Iran in Beirut. And this has now caused a crisis in Lebanon. The Speaker of the House, Berri, who leads the Amal Party, called the ambassador and told him, "Do not move," and called on the government to retreat from a stupid decision. We also just saw the Shia Mufti of Lebanon visit the ambassador and the embassy to stand in solidarity. The government of Lebanon, in its collaboration, has now, I think, crossed a red line. There will be huge repercussions for what they just did.

Either they're going to have to retreat from this position to save themselves, or there will be a total collapse of the government in Lebanon, since there will be no more authority anyway. And one final thing about Lebanon: last night, missiles fell around an unofficial American base in the north of the country, where the Americans have been programming and controlling drones attacking in the region. The word now from the Lebanese military is that an interceptor missile hit an Iranian missile going either to Cyprus or to occupied Palestine, and that it was shot down either by Israeli air defenses in occupied Palestine or by corvettes or destroyers in the Mediterranean belonging to some NATO state. So these are all very, very big stories in Lebanon. It's really hard to keep up with everything. It's a moving story—this war.

Laith, the other question about Lebanon is how Lebanon is able, you know, to shoot down drones from Israel. I've seen some footage—guys carrying a gun on their shoulder and hitting the drones. It's just amazing how they're able to do this. What method are they using to hit the drones coming from Israel?

Yeah, so they're using these shoulder-mounted SAM missiles. Some are Iranian, some are Chinese, some are Russian. And it's working because, you see, the battlefield—the topography in South Lebanon—is really tough. It's not flat; there are crevices, ups and downs, hills, mountains, and valleys. So these drones, especially the attack drones, have to come down lower to see better, and that makes it easier to shoot them down with a shoulder-mounted advanced AA system.

And given that the Israelis have declared losses over the last twenty-some days of this war—twenty-six days now—their losses in Iran are huge in terms of drones, their Hermes 900s and 450s. We're

talking about hundreds of them destroyed over the last twenty-five days in Iran and across the region's battlefields. So they're starting now to use lower-grade, older versions, and they're missing the larger drones they had been directing toward Iran, the ones that could control more of the battlefield for them and give them a better view of what they're seeing.

So their whole capabilities are degrading. And as we saw in Iran, Iran had hidden a lot of its air defenses up until recently. Now, as the United States and Israel's capabilities start degrading in terms of air projection, Iran is bringing out those systems that are shooting down the F-35s and so on. This is also happening here in Lebanon. The longer this war goes—and this is the ultimate strategy of the Axis of Resistance—the more degraded the capabilities of the Zionists become. And once it reaches this level, as we're seeing right now, we're at the abyss point for the capabilities of the West. Everything that Iran and the Axis of Resistance are firing at the Zionist colony or American presence is hitting with ease.

You know, we have two Arab states in the Persian Gulf—Saudi Arabia and the UAE—that were fighting each other before the war started. In Yemen, you remember, Saudi Arabia attacked. But right now, it seems, from what we've seen so far—I don't know how accurate all these reports are from the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal—they're saying that MBS, Mohammed bin Salman, together with MBZ, Mohammed bin Zayed, are both supporting Donald Trump in his war on Iran and want to stay the course, continue the war. What's your interpretation? What do you make of these reports? Do they have anything to do with reality? Are these people ready for a full war against Iran?

There is some truth in these reports, in the sense that when you have a slave at your feet and you, as the master, are doing something, the slave says, "Yes, master, more, master." So the Saud family or the Zayed family are not sovereigns. They don't have a say in what's happening. Their money isn't really their money—it's in American, Israeli, and British banks—and the colonial, imperial powers decide what that money does. Some change is thrown to the house slave, the Saud family, who are supposed to keep the proud Arabian peoples under the oppression of this Wahhabi cult, not allowing them to develop with the billions of dollars discovered through oil. That's the role of the Saud family or the Zayed family.

They're just the house slaves who keep the local population in check and are given enough money to spend—to look like, literally, what a pimp looks like. Okay, the pimp, you know, the archetype of what an Arab person is supposed to be. Okay. And so they're drugged up, they're sent all these prostitutes and kidnapped children to participate in the Epstein-style islands they have inside Dubai and inside Riyadh. I lived in Riyadh, by the way. I lived there, and I know what was happening. My father saw it with his own eyes. I was a child, most of my teenage years, but we know the stories.

What you saw in the Epstein files is the norm inside the palaces of the Saud family. So yes, they're cheering for the master who gave them all these perks and kept them in charge of the whole region for 80 years, to do whatever the master wants.

Do they have a real say? Do they have power? Is their money being spent on this war? Of course, their money has been financing the oppression of Arab and Muslim peoples for 80 years, since they were appointed as the unlawful rulers of this region. So, yeah, Iran needs to strike these vassals, these house slaves—not because they're a threat to Iran, but because it's necessary that these house slaves burn down with the master so our peoples can achieve freedom from slavery, from Zionist and imperialist domination, to free the people of the Arabian Peninsula. Iran needs to attack these royal families and erase them from existence, just as the West has been assassinating families and wiping out whole tribes in its genocidal aims in the region.

I think we've learned from the Iranian foreign ministry that they have evidence showing which country those Tomahawk missiles came from—the ones used to attack that primary school in Iran, where about 168 or 180 kids were killed. And I think Iran knows this is a long war. Since yesterday, Donald Trump has been trying to change the rhetoric—he said on Monday that they were negotiating behind the scenes. It's all lies. He's trying to spread misinformation to gain something in the market, but it doesn't change the reality for the region.

I think these Arab states are, you know, really delusional. I don't know. They were told, Laith, some reports show they were told before this war started that it was going to be over in four days. They were told that by the United States. And I think if these reports coming from the Iranian foreign ministry are true, we're going to see some sort of conflict in the Persian Gulf between Iran and these Arab states. They're not going to be safe anymore if they let the United States use their territory to attack Iranians and kill civilians.

Yeah, I mean, there's no way around the tectonic change that started back on October 7th, right? We're finally coming to the final stage of this war. There have only been two paths forward since October 7th, 2023: either the Zionist colony ceases to exist and the peoples of the region are freed from this hundred-year war, or the Palestinians—all of them—have to be genocided, and all the Arab and Muslim peoples have to be completely enslaved. Okay? This is where we're at. We're at this stage where there was no third option from October 7th. And a lot of people didn't recognize that reality. And of course, those who designed October 7th clearly understood what they were doing and what they were setting in motion.

May their souls rest in peace. So what's in front of us is an existential war where close to two billion people have to decide: are they going to be slaves? And the West has to decide whether it will

maintain its attempt to enslave the Muslim peoples through the existence of this Zionist colony that divides the whole region and the depth of the Arab and Muslim peoples, right? And one thing we should note—if we look at the missiles Iran has been firing over the last 26 days—we'd notice that in the last four days there's been a huge shift. Iran's missiles are now directed not toward Bahrain, the Emirates, and Qatar, but toward the depth of the American presence in Jordan, in the Zionist colony, and in the Saudi regions.

That means, first off, Qatar has almost no more attacks on it. That's because it begged and stopped the Americans from using its territory. There are no more attacks coming from inside Qatar, and it also stopped its propaganda attacks after Iran threatened to hit Al Jazeera, okay? As for the Emirates, Kuwait, and Bahrain—well, in Bahrain and the Emirates there's not much left of an American presence. It's Kuwait that's been getting a lot of hits over the last 24 hours, along with the Saudis, Jordanians, and Israelis.

And that shows that Iran's objectives are reaching their point. The whole thing we talked about in Iraq—that's another sign that the United States will find it impossible to launch a land invasion of Iran without going to war with Iraq. And all of this is going to lead to the collapse of countries like Kuwait, where the elites are running away, or the Emirates, or Bahrain, or Qatar—all of them, their elites have fled. So the end of this war is going to change the face of international politics and the system. This is where we're at.

Nate, there are unconfirmed videos showing thousands of Kuwaitis fleeing to Saudi Arabia after the royal family and the Kuwaiti emirs escaped. Here's the footage. Someone's speaking in Arabic—you might have some understanding of what's being said.

Don't come here. Don't come. Look at all this traffic.

We've spent all day, and now all night, trying to get through the border. This is the border with Saudi Arabia.

#Laith

There are similar scenes on the border with Iraq. Whichever way is closer, people are driving out and leaving. It's not just the royal family—Kuwait is basically a city-state carved out of Iraq by the British to sequester the oil and gas of the country without having a big population to spend it on. That way, you can have an emir you can manipulate and take their money, because they'll have so

much of it and not enough people to spend it on. This is how Kuwait was created. And here we are—Kuwait, as a city-state, has immediately collapsed.

Bahrain has collapsed. The Emirates have collapsed. Qatar—the only thing keeping them alive right now—is Iran not attacking them. So the whole map of the region is going to change. I think in the next week or so, as this war advances to the next stage, the thing to watch for collapse is Jordan. And if the Jordanian regime collapses, there'll be hordes of Arab and Muslim people pouring through the longest border with Palestine, and things will be a totally different story. Then we'll be entering a new stage of this war.

Laith, you mentioned the ground invasion of Iran, and I really think it's totally delusional. I don't know what the plan is behind it—what the agenda is—because if you look at the mainstream media, it's all about this supposed ground invasion of Iran. How could they do that with 12,000 soldiers? It's just delusional. It's unbelievable what's going on. I can't believe someone would even consider it. But we know that the people running the administration in the United States are not rational. And Iran has said, "We're ready; we'll deal with that." From what I understand, Lebanese people—Hezbollah in particular—have a lot of battlefield experience. So what's your understanding of a ground invasion, whether it's one of these islands or actually going into Iran by the Americans?

#Laith

Okay, so if we look at the map of Iran and the ethnic—or whatever—diversity, the linguistic diversity that's there... I hate the term "ethnicity" or "race." They don't exist. It's just cultures that are based on language. And we're all mixed; we're all human beings. We come from the same mother and father. But if you look at the map, there are only three locations that are logical for the United States to attack. One of them is, of course, the southeast—sorry, the southwest—the Khuzestan area that's close to Kuwait, and the islands that are there, but mainly the flats, the floodplains, the southern part of the floodplains of the Euphrates and Tigris Basin that are inside Iran.

And, you know, this is the place where Saddam Hussein attacked Iran in 1981. Of course, he had millions of soldiers to send in, and he did send in millions. But he got bogged down in those floodplains for most of the war, and Iraq lost about a million soldiers in that ten-year war with Iran. So what is the U.S. going to do differently? Because once you enter those lowlands—the flat areas in that region at the top of the Persian Gulf—you're faced with mountains looking down at you, where things can just rain on you from every crevice and cave, and so on. It's impossible to destroy everything that's up in those mountains.

So it's a suicide mission. And the island they're talking about is on the coast of that region, so it would also be a suicide mission to try to capture any of those islands in the northern part of the Persian Gulf. The other possible location is an attack from the Kurdistan—Iraqi Kurdistan—region,

because of the presence of all those Kurdish militias, the Contras, who've been on the payroll of the Mossad and the CIA since the 1940s. And as we've seen over the last week, Iran and the Iraqi resistance have been pounding relentlessly the gathering points of these Kurdish Contras, along with the American and Israeli presence throughout Iraqi Kurdistan. So this is also a failed possibility.

The third possible location is from Pakistan, through Balochistan. And yes, at the beginning of the border it's desert, but then again, there are huge mountains that form a defensive line that would destroy and menace any invading force from there. So it's impossible to achieve anything with the small numbers the Americans are proposing, and even with huge numbers, as the Iraqis attempted. So we'll see these invading forces destroyed. And I think, given that Iraq has now declared war against the Americans, if they try to do anything, the American forces will have to face off with the resistance of Iraq in southern Iraq if they attempt to invade Iran from that direction.

#Nima

I think what would be significant in the long run would be—you mentioned the situation in Iraq. We know they're selling their oil, but the dollars go to the United States, and then the U.S. gives the money to the Iraqi government. I think if they start selling that oil in yuan, in a new currency—like what Iran is trying to do in the Strait of Hormuz—that would be a huge change on their part. Because for such a long time, Americans were controlling all these oil facilities in Iraq. In Syria, for example, one of the main reasons for the fall of Bashar al-Assad's government was the control the United States had over the resources, the oil facilities in Syria. How do you see that happening—the calculation on the part of the governments in the region, basically the governments that are somehow connected with acts of resistance?

#Laith

Well, yeah, we saw, of course, attacks on American and British companies that control much of the oil in southern Iraq, so it's out of business right now. And we saw the Barzani regime in Iraqi Kurdistan closing down the pipelines going to Turkey—and that's for their own reasons, not because they're supporting the axis of resistance—but that, you know, took all the exports from northern Iraq off the market. So this is part of what's adding up to the problems. The Americans have withdrawn all their troops in Iraq to Turkey, Syria, and Jordan. So now this is their second defensive line, after abandoning their first defensive lines in Iraq.

And as we saw over the last 24 hours, the American positions in the Hasakah region, northeast Syria, and the occupation bases around Damascus—because the Americans occupied the Mezze military airport outside Damascus after the fall of the Assad government and even put in air defense systems there that they had withdrawn from Hasakah—have also been destroyed and are under attack. So pretty soon, as this war develops, I think by Friday we'll enter a new stage because of the stupidity of Trump, where ground forces will be used. And that will trigger the ground forces of the Axis of Resistance that are inside Iraq, including close to 40,000 former Syrian soldiers with their

tanks and armored vehicles, who are currently in Iraq and will be moving on locations like Syria and Jordan.

Similarly, the Syrian armed forces that ran away under the bombardment in January 2024 and are now in Lebanon will be activated. This is what I think will happen if the United States is stupid enough to trigger ground wars. Up until now, everything's been in the air—missiles and drones versus jets and cruise missiles. Once we're on the ground, things are going to totally change. And the United States doesn't have the numbers here. Most of these armies in Jordan and the Gulf countries have never fought a ground war. They're all cowards. The only force that really needs to be worried about is the Wahhabi death squads. But the Wahhabi death squads have been called over the war in Syria, and there are only forty or fifty thousand under the command of al-Julani in Damascus. So the ground war is going to change all the borders of the region if it's triggered by Trump—and it seems like it will be triggered by Trump.

Laith, how would you expect Syria—the resistance in Syria—to respond? Because we've learned since the war started that they were trying to bring the HTS headquarters into the war against Lebanon, against Hezbollah. But as time goes by, how do you see the situation in Syria—destabilizing or somehow getting better? It's so much more difficult for the United States, which we know is supporting al-Julani in Syria, to manage that.

#Laith

Yeah, yeah. So the Julani death squads have been trying to help the Zionists in Lebanon multiple times. There's a front in Shebaa Farms, which is the most remote point of South Lebanon on the eastern border, just in the shadow of Mount Hermon and the Golan Heights, where HTS has been imported through the occupied Golan Heights by the Zionists to confront Jamaah Islamiyah. That Islamic group, by the way, is a Sunni resistance group fighting in Shebaa Farms—and Shebaa Farms is a Sunni area. So this is where they're being used to try to defeat the Sunni resistance in South Lebanon, and in the attempts that happened north of the Damascus region and across from it in the Qalamoun Mountains.

And again, the special forces—the red bandanas of HTS—were liquidated in that battle. It doesn't mean they'll be able to do much more. They can make trouble on the border of Lebanon, but not much beyond that. They're so thinly dispersed, having to defend against a possible attack from Iraq, as well as from the north and east of Lebanon. So, being that spread out, I don't think they'll be able to make any real change in the battle in Lebanon. And if a full ground war is launched around the Iraq region, I think they'll be busy trying to defend their eastern flank.

Part of this war, Laith, is the false flag operations we've seen so far—against Azerbaijan, then Turkey, then Oman. The Iranians said they didn't attack Turkey or Oman. These are false flag operations by the Israelis to create chaos in the region. But what's really important is the possibility that Israel might bomb Iran or carry out some kind of false flag operation at Al-Aqsa Mosque, which is deeply significant for everyone in the region. It's not something people would ignore or downplay, or just set aside as part of the conflict. It would be huge if they did that, because we know there's an agenda in Israel to build the Third Temple. What's your understanding if things go that way and Israel moves in that direction?

Well, as a media and propaganda expert, I think we need to notice right now that the Zionists and the imperialists have completely lost the propaganda war. In fact, their thrashing on this battlefield has been historic in terms of human development. There's nobody on this planet right now who doesn't view the Zionist and the American empire as the Epstein class—as the pedophilic, child-cannibalizing evil. The word "evil" itself is now normalized when we talk about this. There's no going back. So false flags don't really matter anymore, because nobody has any sympathy for this cannibalistic, pedophilic class on the planet.

So when we think about it, whether it was a false flag or not, it doesn't really matter. These attacks on Oman or Turkey, or even that attack on those stupid ambulances of the Jewish supremacist group in the United Kingdom, aren't going to garner any sympathy for the Zionists or the Americans. Similarly, they're not going to change the objectives or positions of the governments of Turkey, Oman, or the UK. The UK is already, for instance, involved in this war. It's lying, it's providing all its bases and ammunition to arm the Americans as they carry out these long-range bombardments of Iran. And its bases in Cyprus are spying on the whole region and actually bombing Lebanon and bombing Palestine.

So it's fully involved. Let's say that attack on the ambulances—will it change the UK's position and make them enter a war they're already in? It won't. Will it change the views of UK citizens? No, because UK citizens already hate Israel and hate the United States. Nothing's going to change that. And anything coming out of the imperialists and the Zionists—everyone has a question mark on it now. Nobody believes anything that comes out of their mouths. So, in a way, if these are false flags—the attacks on, you know, NATO positions in Turkey or American positions in Oman—well, that's an own goal.

You actually helped Iran by destroying something, and it's not going to change the position of the Turkish government or the Turkish public. Okay, that's already settled. So that's one thing. In fact, maybe after this war, we'll find out that Iran did attack these positions because it was important, for instance, for its defense. But you see, it doesn't matter at this point, because for the whole world, it'

s going to take 30 or 40 years to have another generation that can be manipulated with Western and Zionist propaganda. And the Zionists in the West don't have time for that. This is why their own propagandists are giving up and getting more and more filthy.

This is why their own president and minister of war are talking like crazies—because they don't give a damn anymore. Okay, so, because they've lost them. And attacks on Al-Aqsa may happen. Is it going to make the Sunni populations of the world blame Iran? Of course not. Of course not. It's actually going to boil the blood of all Muslim people to come for revenge for Al-Aqsa—from the Zionists, from the Saudis, from the Emiratis who are allowing this to happen, who are spending their money on it. Watch these videos in the Saudi Twittersphere. If you look there, you'll see people criticizing the Saud family, unlike before.

The Saudi family itself is unable to keep up with jailing people because it's fighting a war on behalf of the Zionists against Iran. It can't even police its own social media or jail en masse the number of people criticizing the tectonic changes in Egypt. The Twittersphere in Egypt is producing such high-art propaganda, comedy, and so on—making fun of the Saudis and anyone who has American bases. It's a changed world. It's a changed world. If the Zionists make the mistake of attacking Al-Aqsa Mosque, it's going to bring hundreds of millions of people marching by themselves, without their governments, to come and cannibalize the Zionists on behalf of humanity.
