

Laith Marouf: Hezbollah Launches MASSIVE Air & Ground Assault

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#Nima

Hi everybody, today is Wednesday, May 6th, 2026, and our dear friend, our brother Laith Marouf from Beirut, is here with us. Welcome back, Laith.

#Laith

Great to be with you, Nima.

#Nima

Laith, let's start with the situation in Lebanon and the buffer zone that the Israelis wanted to make in the southern part of Lebanon. What can we learn right now about what's going on in the southern part of Lebanon, the confrontation? Is there anything happening on the ground?

#Laith

Yeah, I mean, up until now, the Zionists are getting their behinds handed to them. Just a few hours ago, the Zionist media announced that one of their advancing columns got under attack, an ambush. We saw videos yesterday released by Hezbollah of their FPVs, you know, hitting gatherings of Israeli soldiers, not even inside any armored vehicles or something like that. We also heard a few hours ago the Israelis say that one of their helicopters was shot down. So the resistance is hunting these sitting ducks every day. Yesterday, Hezbollah announced, I think, 18 different operations. And so when we look at the output of videos that are coming out from Hezbollah statements, as well as the admittance of these Zionists, it's clear that they are suffering huge losses.

They're unable to advance anywhere they want, every day, during the day and every night. During the night, they're getting bombarded. There's no air defense that can protect them. Announcements from the Israeli military just over the last two days said their multiple new tactics to defend themselves from FPVs or drones have all failed. We even watched one of those videos from an FPV go through this protection net that the Zionists put around their tanks, blow up the tank, so nothing

is working for them. And because there are no fortifications in South Lebanon where these Zionists are advancing to, they are easy targets. There's no air defense to fight off any attacks on them, and the number of Israeli tanks that have been destroyed in South Lebanon now is over 250 tanks. This is a huge number, yeah.

And every day we see more and more of them. This is, of course, because of these losses, the Zionists keep on increasing their attacks on civilian sites. We saw yesterday, you know, at least 20 Lebanese people being martyred in different attacks on villages in the south of Lebanon. And, you know, the only response that the Zionists have to their military failures is to increase the human price on civilians in Lebanon. But that's not going to change anything on the battlefield. And this is, I think, where they're stuck, the Zionists.

Laith, if you were to compare the Israeli defense system or the way they can defend themselves against Hezbollah, how do you see the difference between their capabilities before this war started and right now, as we see it's happening not only in the southern part of Lebanon but in the northern part of Israel as well?

Yeah, so we look at the 66-Day War in 2024. Obviously, the Israelis had at that time the whole West behind them, and they were not busy attacking Iran. And so in that 66-Day War, with all the full capabilities that they had, they weren't able to advance much beyond the first line of villages, and the main villages like Al-Khiyam and others they were unable to occupy. And so that was two years ago. Now the Israelis, according to their own admittance, have already lost a thousand tanks inside Gaza and in Lebanon in the 66-Day War. So now they're coming in with a weakened military, with the vast majority of their advanced tanks destroyed in Gaza and Lebanon in the last round of war, with their reservists overstretched, and many of their generals either killed or dead in Gaza and in Lebanon during that first wave.

And many of their skilled soldiers have left the country, and so they're depending more and more on a younger fighting force, the Israelis. And the Israelis are good in one thing militarily, which is to bombard from air — you know, one of the biggest air forces in the world and an unlimited amount of munitions supplied to them by the West to bombard from air. But once they go on the ground, even in the best conditions, they are cowards. Their only training is to kill children and women and unarmed civilians in the West Bank and in Gaza. So once they are on the ground, the Israeli military starts collapsing. Now, add to it all those conditions that we talked about — of already deteriorating power and equipment and quality of soldiers — and we can see why they are losing so many tanks and soldiers inside South Lebanon right now, even more than the 66-Day War.

I mean, we look at those videos that Hezbollah is releasing from the FPVs, and when you notice six or seven tanks and APCs all gathered in one place, that's a stupid move. This is something you don't do except if you're an amateur, and this is what it truly is. The army of the Zionists is an amateur force. So they're gathering their soldiers in homes that they're occupying — you know, the only homes that are left in a village they've already destroyed. So it's even an easy target as a gathering point for the soldiers. There is zero tactical assessment working for the Zionists, and they are putting themselves in situations that make them very, very easy targets. And that's because of the deterioration of the quality of equipment they have and the deterioration of the quality of the soldiers.

From what we've seen so far with the case of Hezbollah and its capabilities to fight back — because you remember when Bashar al-Assad, you know, was almost removed from power in Syria — many people were arguing that this is the end for Hezbollah and that they cannot fight back. You know, how is the situation with Hezbollah and their capabilities today?

We look at, again, the videos that are being released from Hezbollah, and it's clear that they have restocked their weapons, that whatever the Israelis destroyed in the first wave of the war in 2024 was very marginal in terms of the amount of rockets or drone warehouses that the Israelis were able to destroy. And, you know, we're seeing Hezbollah use drones, FPVs, guided missiles, ballistic missiles, hypersonic missiles. Those are all clear indications that the stockpiles of Hezbollah are very healthy. And, you know, it seems like the collapse of Syria under the control of the Wahhabis gave more motivation for Hezbollah to be truly able to sustain itself without a direct supply route through Syria.

So I think what we saw, and we may probably get proof of this in the next few years as things become more clear, is that Hezbollah maybe has accelerated its ability to manufacture at home here these weapons. So there must be right now, as we saw from those videos, the Hezbollah fighters were putting together these FPVs piece by piece, you know, soldering and so forth. So there are whole manufacturing lines inside Lebanon right now that make it not have to worry about supply routes through Syria or through the Mediterranean, which is controlled by UNIFIL here, the United Nations forces, their navy that is controlling all the entry of boats and ships into Lebanese waters.

So I think Hezbollah has now reorganized itself to make sure that it can sustain resistance without anything having to be shipped to the country or go through Syrian territory since the fall of the Assad government. And so sometimes, as we saw with Iran over the last 30-some-odd years, these blockades and sieges are a blessing in order to nationalize and indigenize technologies in a country that is under attack by the imperialists and the Zionists.

Laith, there are people who are arguing that Hezbollah, you know, can be redefined within the system in Lebanon. How do you see the people in Lebanon feeling about Hezbollah and the future of Hezbollah and the future of the country, considering the sort of government they have and the combination of both Hezbollah and the government? Because we know how the West is investing and trying to do everything to put pressure on Lebanon to bring some sort of civil war in Lebanon. But how do the people feel about what's going on in Lebanon?

Yeah, I mean, we look at the surveys done of the Lebanese population, and we can see that the absolute majority of the Shia population, something around 90-something percent, are supportive of Hezbollah and against disarmament. Similarly, in the Sunni population, over 70-some-odd percent of the Sunni population, again, as an absolute majority, is against the disarmament of Hezbollah and against normalization with the Zionist colony. And within the Christian population, it's over 60%, even in the Maronite sect, which is the closest to imperialism. And for those who don't know, there are a lot of Orthodox and Catholic and Chaldean and Assyrian Christians in Lebanon; it's not only Maronites. So even in the Maronite population, over 60% are against the disarmament of Hezbollah and/or the normalization with the Zionist colony.

So I think both the valiant resistance that Hezbollah put up, that showed the efficiency of resistance—how you can actually resist the United States and the Zionists, even with a small population and a small territory like Lebanon, effectively—as well as the unhindered massacres that ISIS-HTS committed inside Syria after the collapse of the Assad government, have reinforced that feeling within the Lebanese population. The Christians, the Druze, the Alawis, even the Sunnis of Lebanon, when they watched how the religious sites and the religious leaders and communities were targeted—even when we talk about the Sunnis, being the vast majority of Syrian Sunnis and Lebanese Sunnis are Sufi—and the Sufi preachers and seminaries were attacked immediately by HTS after taking over the government, and many of those imams were killed.

That, I think, threatened a lot of even the Sunnis in Lebanon, and they don't want to see what happened in Syria happen to them. So this reinforced support for the resistance, and the intentional attacks on Christian villages and/or on Sunni institutions in Lebanon that the Israelis committed over the last few months, whether it's the destruction of the statue of Jesus Christ and/or the desecration of churches in the south of Lebanon, or the attacks on the Sunni non-profit that helps the disabled and the orphans here in Lebanon, in Saida.

Al-Maqasid Association, which is the main charitable arm of the Sunni population here in Lebanon, immediately triggered an opposite reaction to what the Zionists wanted. The Zionists were attacking these Christian and Sunni sites and organizations to kind of force these people to say, hey, stop Hezbollah because they're attacking me. No, the reaction was the opposite. The reaction was,

Hezbollah, defend us more. Okay, so I think this is the overall, you know, what is happening in terms of the feelings here in Lebanon among the population.

Laith, the situation in the southern part of Lebanon, I think, is so important for the decision-makers in Lebanon, both in Hezbollah and the government in Lebanon. And we know that the policy of Hezbollah is fighting back and resistance. They're not going to back down on that. But what is the policy of the government when it comes to the southern part of Lebanon? Because they know Israelis are talking about creating a buffer zone in the southern part of Lebanon that goes to the Litani River. I would say it's going to go beyond the Litani River. And how do they communicate that with the Lebanese people?

Yeah, the Lebanese government is having a hard time explaining to the Lebanese population what it really wants. There are contradictory messages in the same statements that are coming out from the president, the prime minister, and the government. On the one hand, they are arguing that state sovereignty entails that only the government is the one that can declare war against anyone and/or carry arms to defend the country. On the other hand, they're refusing to send the military to defend the south of Lebanon. So I think much of how this government is acting feels out of time. You know, it's like, as we say in Arabic, he's going to the Hajj as everybody is coming back. Okay. So it's like, you know, maybe this language of the collaborationist government here in Lebanon would have worked 15 years ago in the middle of the quote-unquote Arab Autumn. Right.

But we all watched, the whole world watched a genocide happen in Gaza. We all watched how the Saudi and Emirati regimes and so forth collaborated with the Israelis to attack Iran, to also destroy Syria. And so it is suicidal. What the Lebanese government is doing today is suicidal because their sponsors, the Zionists and the Americans, are actually at their weakest point in history. Okay, so for anyone that is critical even of Hezbollah, when they are watching how the Lebanese government is maneuvering itself in these statements, they are also feeling disappointed because there's nothing innovative in what this government is saying, and even their propaganda is not that good. It's not manipulative enough to get the Lebanese population to somehow blame everything on Hezbollah. So I think the Lebanese officials, the President and the Prime Minister, are putting themselves in a dead end.

It's a one-way street that they're taking, and it's a dead end at the end. There's no way for them to retreat from the positions that they're taking. And every time they make a statement that is critical of Hezbollah or is somehow supportive of the imperialists, it's digging them deeper into the hole. And I think there's nothing that the government of Lebanon can do to better the aims of the

imperialists and the Zionists in Lebanon. And they cannot deliver on what the West wants. They want them to disarm Hezbollah, but they don't have the power to. They don't have the manpower to. They don't have the weapons to. And Hezbollah is just ignoring them and is continuing.

And this is partially, I think, why... You know, a lot of people are asking, why is Hezbollah not leading a coup? Or why isn't there a revolution in Lebanon against these, you know, collaborationist prime minister and president? And the truth is, because actually there is no power in the Lebanese government. And so why even fight for it? Let them talk. Let them waste the money of the Saudis, the Emiratis, and the Qataris, and the Zionists and Americans that are throwing all this money on these politicians and on the imperialist media. Let them spend it, because it has no effect. It's better that they spend it there than spending it on weapons to kill Lebanese people or Palestinian people.

Laith, is there still a threat coming from Syria in the northern part of Lebanon? Or do you feel that the situation, the war, has changed the mindset in Syria, that they don't want to go that far against Lebanon?

There were a few statements made by al-Julani's regime over the last week and a half, clearly just to appease the Zionists. One of those statements was that they showed their forces entering a tunnel on the border between Lebanon and Syria and claiming that this was a smuggling tunnel for Hezbollah. There was a video of them somehow capturing what they called Hezbollah fighters in the south of Syria near the occupied Golan Heights, with a truck with missiles on the back of it. And the forces of HTS were dressed in all this fancy camouflage, and the truck with the missiles on it and so forth. It was really well made up for the cameras. But it was obvious that neither Hezbollah was involved in this and that it's all theatrics. Even the missiles and the truck that they were using are clearly not stuff that Hezbollah has ever used.

So it doesn't fit even the style of Hezbollah weaponry. Hezbollah has made multiple statements that it has no active members inside Syria, and I believe them. That doesn't mean that there is no resistance and Hezbollah is not supporting this resistance in Syria, but there are no official Hezbollah members inside the country. And also Hezbollah said that, you know, that tunnel that they showed was inactive for more than—that it was actually a Palestinian resistance tunnel from the 1980s and 70s. So, you know, while HTS is attempting to prove to its masters in Tel Aviv and Washington that it's doing services as it's required to limit resistance in Syria, it is unable to really provide any military value to the attacks on Lebanon, and they will not be able to actually attack Lebanon.

I don't think they will dare do that because they're too scared about the situation inside Syria. Inside Syria, there's only around 60,000 HTS fighters, and they're barely keeping control of the traffic in the country. Because HTS dismissed everybody in the military, everybody in the police forces, and so

forth, there's no real security apparatus to control the country. At any moment, if HTS sends its soldiers to attack Lebanon, parts of Syria will secede, like Suwaidah or the northeast or even the coast, and it will be impossible for HTS to recapture those parts of Syria. So I think there are limitations to what HTS can deliver on. And there's a huge difference between that reality of what they can deliver on and what the propaganda wants us to believe they can.

GCC countries are experiencing something new because of the outcome of the war, which you've seen with the case of the UAE getting out of OPEC, OAPEC, and they're talking about leaving GCC countries. When looking at GCC countries today, how do you find the way that the UAE is behaving? Is that something new, or did we have it before with the case of Saudi Arabia confronting the UAE in Yemen, Somalia, Libya? They had these differences, but it seems that this time around it's going to be different. What is that difference, in your opinion?

Well, look, you know, I'm a big critic of the Saud family. But they had an emirate principality in the heart of Arabia around Riyadh since the late 1700s. So there is some continuity to this existence of the Saudi kingdom. The Emirati ruling family is a fabrication of the British occupation of Oman. Remember, there's no such thing as the United Arab Emirates. The land is called the desert of Oman, and this was part of Oman until the British cut it off in the early 1970s when they fabricated the UAE. And the idea was to take as much of the oil and gas that would have been Oman's and put it in the hands of this very small population.

When the British fabricated the UAE, the population was around 60,000. Oman has millions as a population, and it's a historical cultural center for the region. It's hundreds and thousands of years of civilization there. So this, you know, taking away of the gas and oil of Oman and putting it into this fabricated entity with a small population meant that Oman cannot influence politics in the region as it should with a big population, or with this history of it controlling Balochistan in Pakistan or controlling Mozambique in Africa. This was a much longer history of a civilization or a state than the United Arab Emirates.

So I can understand how the UAE sees that it needs to run away from Oman and Saudi, especially with the rise of Oman's status right now as a peacemaker, as a negotiator of peace and so on. Being open to Iran and being open to Yemen is threatening to the UAE. And the UAE knows that if its fabricated financial model, or glass tower model, is unable to come back to its prominence, it means that the money they have will have zero influence. Therefore, they need to right now compete again with the rise of Oman and a possible rise of the Saud family even more, because the ruling families in the UAE are just imported branches of the Saud family.

You see, sometimes people forget why there is actually a feud between Qatar, the UAE, and Saudi Arabia. It's because they're the same ruling family, and branches of them were imported by the British from Saudi to Qatar and the UAE. And those branches of the family in Qatar and the UAE think that they know better than the main branch of the Saud family. And that's their internal fight. And so, yeah, the UAE finds itself right now in a really bad situation because its true size has been outed in the configuration of this battle that we saw over the last year.

You're saying that they're basically coming from the same tribe or the same family? And they're all coming from Saudi Arabia?

#Laith

Yes. So the Thani family in Qatar and the Zayed family in the Emirates, they're all branches of the same clan within the Saud family, just imported in the 1950s and 60s to build, you know, kind of fake emirs in there. Because again, the Emirates were just part of Oman, and the Sultan of Oman is the one that ruled those. And in general, the Emirates was empty, right? It's a desert beach that had a few villages on it, fishing villages.

And even till today, the population of citizens of the United Arab Emirates is less than a million, something like eight hundred or nine hundred thousand. And even among those eight or nine hundred thousand citizens, half of them have been given citizenship — you know, people from other countries who were granted citizenship just to increase the population, most of them being Saudi, by the way. So the existence of both Qatar and the Emirates is fabricated and accelerated in terms of population imports from outside, including the royal families, quote unquote.

But the difference, Laith, is somehow unbelievable because you know what happened yesterday — an attack on Fujairah. Because in Fujairah, they were trying to export oil, and something happened there. I don't know, missile attack, drone attack. And the officials of the UAE are saying that this is their May 4th, 2026. It's like October 7th. How is it possible someone goes that far to be so connected with Israel? Why do they need that, in your opinion?

#Laith

Yeah, I mean, when I saw that statement, I was like, oh my God, you're burying yourself deeper into the Zionist behind, you know. It's just unbelievable. And, you know, look, the existence of this, you know, colony — both the Zionist colony or this fake state, the UAE — is dependent on force. Nature and geography tell us there shouldn't be a UAE. Nature and geography tell us there shouldn't

be a Zionist colony, that Palestine, Lebanon, and Syria are one population and one people. Similarly, the Arabian Peninsula, or, you know, nature tells us Iran as a state has to exist within these borders that are natural borders — mountains here, mountains there, water here, water there.

As a natural, nature forces you into having a civilization within this line. So the only way that these unnatural, fabricated, counter-to-history political entities can exist is continued force, use of force. And in this situation, all the Arab monarchs, the only reason that they exist today is because the West and the Zionists protected them against the revolutions, anti-colonial revolutions that happened in the 1940s, 50s, and 60s across the whole planet. And so right now what we see is, with the destruction of all the old anti-colonial movements in the region, the last of them being the Syrian state, we're back to kind of the beginning, since the only resistance right now is the Axis of Resistance in the name of Shia Islam mainly.

So the original sources of liberation against colonialism here — Syrian unification, Arab unification, and even Sunni resistance — have been defeated, okay, save for Hamas. And so what we see is that the imperialist tools, these royal families, felt so much hubris that all their enemies, after 100 years, have been killed and destroyed. Every Arab republic from Libya to Yemen and Syria has been destroyed. They feel so much hubris and so safe under these conditions that they are using language like "October 7th," or, you know, saying that you have no choice. There's a Saudi commentator that was talking about reforming Islam. So they feel so safe under those conditions that they're outing themselves 100% as Zionist tools and imperialist lackeys, and that they are in themselves anti-Muslim.

So this is the condition that is birthing these things. And I think, again, I go back to that moment of saying, it's like somebody going to the Hajj while everybody else is coming back. God damn, everybody knows that the Zionists are genocidal garbage. The imperialists will abuse you and use you and throw you away. And now you're coming out and standing with the Zionists and attacking Islam when everybody is asking what Islam is and how can I convert to it because of the beautiful images of self-sacrifice that the Palestinians and the Lebanese and the Iranians and the Yemenis and the Iraqis put forward. So it is a last-ditch attempt by these vassals to get the imperialists and the Zionists to save them one more time.

Laith, do you think that the war between Iran and the United States has somehow changed some countries in the GCC or their policies and calculations? How do you see their calculations right now? You mentioned Oman. Oman is, in my opinion, a totally different country in that region. There's so much independence compared to other countries in that region. But how do you see, as time goes by with the case of war? We know what's going on with the war. There is no ceasefire, just some sort of pause. They can attack each other at any moment, as it was. We've seen what happened

yesterday — they're firing at each other. But how did the war change the mindset in Saudi Arabia and Qatar, these two important countries? I'm not talking about Kuwait and Bahrain. I think they're important, but not as important as Saudi Arabia and Qatar.

Well, Qatar, we saw a 180-degree change. And that was because of the valuable whipping lesson that Iran gave to the Qatari regime with those attacks on the American bases there and the threat to attack Al Jazeera when it was propagating imperialist points of view. So immediately we saw how Qatar realized that one missile from Iran in the middle of Doha would end it as a state. So, you know, we look at how even the propaganda of Qatar changed. Although still, you know, we watched those Al Jazeera TV shows with that amazing Iranian professor, you know, debating eight different Zionists and imperial lackeys.

He's still being allowed that space, which is clearly an example of how Qatar's behavior has changed. It didn't change fully as we would like it to, but Qatar is out of the picture in terms of allowing its territory, land, air, and sea to be used to attack Iran. So that's a blessing, a good first step. The Saudi regime, I think, will have a longer path to correct their position. There was a call today between the foreign affairs minister of the Saudi regime and Iran's foreign minister, who's on his way to China. And that was at the request of the Saudis.

He's in China right now.

#Laith

Yes, he's in China right now. And I think they called him on purpose because they're like, oh, before you talk to the Chinese, can you talk to me? And so I think this is another example of seeing how behavior is changing. Do I trust the Saudis? No, I don't trust them. Because they are the cornerstone of imperialist policies towards all Muslims. The Saud family controlling Mecca and Medina means that the empire controls the holy sites of Islam, with Jerusalem also being under control of the Zionists. So, I think the partnership between the Zionists, the Saud family, and the imperialists is going to be the hardest to break.

But as the smaller players in the Arabian Peninsula start breaking down their economies and/or their ability to send money to support the imperialist and Zionist aims, and/or internal struggles begin in those countries, and as the prominence of Yemen rises, this will force the Saud family to start thinking about saving themselves. And so I think if this war continues—and it will continue—we may start seeing changes in the behavior of the Saud family, at least their public outward behavior. And that will only be thanks to the steadfastness of the Axis of Resistance and the amazing performance of the weapons produced by Iran and the Axis of Resistance.

You know, the situation in Qatar, as we've seen what has happened so far—the attack on Ras Laffan—it was 17% of LNG, you know, the capacity of LNG in Qatar was hit. And it hit the economy in Qatar in a way that we haven't seen before in the history of the country. I think that's why right now in Qatar they're feeling it, because they're so close. By the way, the geography of Qatar is different from other countries. You remember those days when they tried to put some sort of blockade on Qatar? Who helped Qatar? It was Iran that helped Qatar and facilitated because they wanted to put a lot of pressure on them.

But after all, I think it's not just about Saudi Arabia and Qatar. You see Bahrain. Bahrain was so important before this war started because of the American troops and base in Bahrain, and Kuwait as well. They have lost all the capacity, all the capacity to export oil since this war started. And we need, I think after all, there has to be some sort of security architecture for the region that benefits the Axis of Resistance, that benefits the Palestinian people, that can put some sort of pressure on Israelis. And do you think that would happen anytime soon?

Not anytime soon. And look, what Iran and the Axis of Resistance are doing is ground-shifting, and whatever comes out of this war in general will not be something that is modified from what was there before. It has to be a break with the reality that was before it. Just like how the project to create the Zionist colony and these monarchies in the Arabian Peninsula required the shattering of the Ottoman Empire and putting borders that didn't exist before the fabric. So the fall or the collapse of the Zionist colony, or the exit of the United States from Western Asia, will not lead to just band-aids or cosmetic changes. It will lead to the collapse of the order that was implemented after World War I, meaning countries like Kuwait or Bahrain or Qatar that have an indigenous population of less than 300,000 people.

I think Qatar is around 600,000 and Bahrain around 400,000 citizens. That cannot continue. It has to be merged into a bigger polity, an Arab unified state or whatever it is. And when we look even into a further outlook, there has to be unity between the three major cultural civilizations here in the region: the Indo-Iranian, the Turkic, and the Semitic or Arabic populations. These are the three core civilizations of the Muslim world. So there has to be an architecture of security that, number one, guarantees all these civilizations equality between themselves.

So there is no competition between the Indo-Iranian versus the Arabic versus the Turkic, and a possibility for us to have this security architecture that defends us from outside forces. And so I think this is where things will go towards. It doesn't mean it's going to happen in a day or two. But if Turkey and Iran, let's say, get better together, but there's ten Arabic states beside them that are each competing with each other and are weak and cannot speak on the same platform as Iran as a civilization or Turkey, that will not provide security for Iran and Turkey. The rise of a unified Arabic

polity in Western Asia is, I think, the guarantee also of safety and security for the Iranian peoples and the Turkic peoples.

Let's see what would happen. I think the war can happen anytime. Many people are arguing that this weekend we're going to have a new round of war happening. And let's see what would happen.
