

Alex Krainer: Iran RETALIATES Against Kuwait, Bahrain & Jordan!

Hi, everybody. Today is Thursday, June 11th, 2026, and our dear friend, our brother Alex Krainer is here with us. Welcome back, Alex. Thank you, Nima. Good to join you again. Greetings to everyone out there. Alex, we're back to war. The United States attacked Iran last night, and we had the Iranian response. They attacked cities in the southern part of Iran, close to the Persian Gulf—two islands, Qeshm Island and Sirik Island—and they used Tomahawk missiles. What was so important, in my opinion, was the use of Tomahawk missiles. They said CENTCOM and Donald Trump reported that they used something like 46 Tomahawk missiles. What is the importance of that?

They don't need to get close to the Iranian border—far away from the Iranian border, using Tomahawk missiles to hit the targets. And most of these targets were close to the Persian Gulf, the cities and the islands. We had some reports from Karaj, which is close to the Iranian capital. Then we had at least two bombings there, and that's all. All targets were in the southern part, and two strikes in the city of Karaj, at least from what we've seen last night. And then the Iranian response on Kuwait, Jordan, and Bahrain. There's some footage that came out last night showing they hit a target at the Muwaffaq Salti Airbase in Jordan. Right now, we've learned just moments ago—there's no confirmation, by the way.

The latest news says that they have hit some fighter jets in that airbase. This is the current situation with the war. And Donald Trump, before starting to attack Iran, said, we want to put pressure on them to accept the deal. What is that deal? We don't know. The Qatari delegation went to Iran yesterday. We thought that they got out of Iran before the attack happened. No, today it was confirmed that they were in Iran when the United States was attacking Iran. And today they left Iran. This is one part. And the other important point is that all of this is coming after some sort of allegation, some sort of story coming from the United States that it was an Apache helicopter in the Strait of Hormuz, which was shot by an Iranian drone near Hormuz.

The helicopter, the pilots—two pilots—are alive, no injuries, nothing. The whole story is so fragile, and I don't know if there is somebody or anybody who would believe what they're talking about. And here is where we are headed right now: Donald Trump is seeking—he wants to force Iranians into a

new position to accept his terms. Iran said before coming to this, we had an Iranian military advisor to the Supreme Leader of Iran. He said, we are going to force the United States to accept our terms. They cannot do it to us. This is the position of the Iranians and Donald Trump. Go ahead, your take on that.

Well, I don't see how Iranians could possibly make the United States accept Iranian terms when the United States has the greatest military in the history of the Milky Way galaxy. And they can do everything. And the last version about the Apache helicopter that I got from three sources close to the Pentagon is that Captain America himself swooped in and rescued the pilots. I'm sorry, it's so beyond belief, the stories that they're spinning. I mean, the Apache helicopter story—I've heard so many versions by now, and it's just getting more fantastical as they retell it again and again, that you can't possibly believe anything. But you always hear, "the greatest military ever in the history of creation." Yeah, maybe, you know, but they're kind of spread thinly across the whole world in some 800 military bases.

And to my mind, Donald Trump and his team decided to double down on stupidity. Because I don't see why they think they can force the Iranian government to submit themselves to their terms. Iran is there. They're at home. They're fighting an existential war. The United States is 10,000 miles away from home, fighting a war of choice. So the United States has naval assets and it has military bases. And they're all right there on the surface. They can't move. Well, the ships can move, but military bases can't move. The Iranians, who have prepared for this for more than 20 years, have most of their key, most sensitive assets dug deep underground. So they're extremely difficult to destroy. Maybe they're impossible to destroy.

And so every time there's an exchange of fire, the Iranians inflict damage that the United States cannot easily reverse. The United States, if they hit anything of importance, they inflict damage that is relatively easy for the Iranians to reverse and repair, right? So every time you exchange gunfire, missiles, bombs, whatever, one side is getting progressively weakened and one side, at worst, stays more or less at the same level. It's very difficult to demystify the thinking that goes into these decisions. But I read reports from Russian intelligence agencies that say that all this nonsense—the talks, the ceasefire—that this is all cover in preparation for a ground offensive. Okay, that makes sense. But ground offensive when? In July? What sense does that make? It's like absolutely the hottest time of the year. It's... it's brutal.

Again, it favors the defender versus the attacker. So where are they going with this? It's like they're sprinting into the jaws of defeat. I don't really understand. And then, you know, Trump's statements—it's better not to hear them because it's just going farther and farther into, on the one hand, fantastical, and it's getting more and more vulgar. It seems to me like they don't know what

to do, and the only thing they know how to do is drop bombs. So they say, like, what do we do now? Well, what the hell, let's just drop more bombs and see, maybe something happens. At any rate, I think that their position is growing weaker and weaker.

I think particularly Israel's position is growing weaker and weaker. They don't say it, they don't announce it, but we can see in Israel's conduct of the wars that they have lost confidence in a big way, that they're quite desperate. And one thing that I've been wondering now, because this is like a historical opportunity for Iran to completely change the security architecture in their region—and that, to my mind, means that they have to keep the momentum going, especially as they're hurting their adversaries. And for all these years in preparation for this, they have also created this axis of resistance, which includes probably more assets than we know of.

You mentioned Kataib Hezbollah in Iraq. How powerful that is, we don't know, but it's also part of a larger network of security forces in Iraq, which is allied with Iran. We don't know exactly what happened to parts of the Syrian Arab Army that left Syria after Bashar al-Assad's government fell, but they went somewhere. We know that some parts of it went into Iraq, but who knows, maybe they ended up in Iran as well. And so I've been wondering whether there isn't going to be a ground element to this war—simply start going across Iraq into Syria and then coming to Israel's borders and then start having incursions into Israel.

And so I think that the recent reports about Hezbollah infiltrating Israel—I'm very interested in this sense because at first it was one guy who just went on his own. But then apparently that's not exactly what happened. There are reports that there have been more of these incursions and that now Israelis are not quite sure whether they have enemies inside their borders. So I think that Israel is in a heightened state of anxiety and panic, and there's nothing the United States can really do to help them. So I think the summer is going to be extremely interesting, and I think that the events are going to favor the Iranian position against the United States and Israel.

I think what you've mentioned about the ground invasion—the assessment on the part of Iranian intelligence is the same, because since the start of the war, the United States is attacking Iran, and we were watching Iran attacking Erbil, Iraqi Kurdistan. It's not responding to the United States, but they're attacking Iraqi Kurdistan because they thought there may be some sort of movement on that part—they wanted to get in or maybe attack Iranians. That's why they were controlling Iraqi Kurdistan in Erbil. I would say that Erbil is just becoming maybe a new Gaza, because they see what is happening. The people are, you know, they're coming in, they're trying to get in, but there are some areas where they're using these terrorist groups. And Iran has just been leveling—they have been leveling these areas.

And the other point with the American attack—they tried to hit the petrochemical plant in Assaluyeh, close to Bushehr. Two Tomahawk missiles were intercepted in that. This is a new thing for the

Iranian air defense system; we haven't seen that before. Then CENTCOM came out and said, "We didn't attack the petrochemical plant." But people on the ground are confirming that it has happened, because they thought in the initial hours the reports were this: the United States hit the petrochemical plant in Assaluyeh. They said that. Then they said, no, the smoke that is coming up is because of those plants. The Tomahawk missiles—they hit the Tomahawk missiles—and nothing has happened, no damage to the petrochemical plant. That was the whole story. When it comes to the invasion, I think it's so stupid, Alex.

I don't see any viable choice for the United States to go with the invasion. Let's assume that they're going to do something in the Persian Gulf, you know, with Khark Island as they were talking about, or with Qeshm Island. Or maybe at the same time, they do something in the Persian Gulf and they're asking these Kurdish people to come in from the other side, or maybe Baluchi people. But the intelligence is so—they're monitoring everything in Iran. They know the movement before the attack happens; they're preempting everything on their borders. These are all preemptive attacks. And if the United States comes into the Persian Gulf, that would be a huge confrontation between the United States and Iran. And I don't see any sort of good scenario for the United States if they decide to do that.

Yeah, I agree with that, Nima. And I think—oh, by the way, a question. A few hours ago, we had reports that the Iranians struck an American ship with a hypersonic anti-ship missile. Is that confirmed? No, it was Israeli media. Yes, yes, Israeli media.

Two times. They said that Iran hit an American warship. Then they said it was a hypersonic missile. Later on, they said Iran hit two commercial ships in the Strait of Hormuz. Then people came out and confused that first ship that was hit with the second report in the Strait of Hormuz. They said maybe those two ships were mentioned in that report, but there is no confirmation. We don't know what has happened. That could be the case. That could be the case because CENTCOM said none of the American warships were hit by Iranian missiles or drones. But CENTCOM denied that. But CENTCOM, again, they're denying the closure of the Strait of Hormuz. The Strait of Hormuz is totally closed as we thought.

They said no ships — not Chinese, Russian, Pakistani, nothing. Nothing is passing through right now. And the United States, CENTCOM said, no, the Strait is open. And even today we had an article in the Financial Times that says there is a narrow corridor close to the Omani border that they're using, which was totally denied by the Iranians for the last two, three days. They said that doesn't exist. They're trying to make that sort of argument to make some sort of solution, some sort of delusion

for the oil tankers. Because that's why last night we've seen some of these oil tankers being hit by Iranians, because they thought they could pass through the Strait of Hormuz. This is the way that the United States is manipulating the region, believing that they can convince these tankers to go.

Not only the region, but also the oil markets, you know, because, you know, if they're sneaking out, you know, 200 million barrels of oil out of the Gulf and the Iranians can do nothing about it, then people would think like, oh, well, yay, we're almost close to normal. It used to be 30 to 40 tankers' worth of oil per day. So now what, is Trump insinuating that they're doing 10, 20? So that's almost back to normal, but that's almost certainly not true. I mean, it's very unfortunate that we cannot believe anymore one single word that comes out of the U.S. administration because they keep spinning stories, and then very quickly it turns out that they're not true. And so then, particularly, the best version of their stories is automatically suspect, so you cannot believe anything at all.

You know, what was noticeable last night is that Iran didn't attack the UAE. Iran didn't attack Saudi Arabia or the UAE, but they attacked Jordan, Kuwait, and Bahrain. I don't know what the main reason is, basically, when it comes to the UAE, but if... Trump last night said, Israel is not part of this operation. They're not helping us. They're not doing anything. The Israelis confirmed in various statements that we are not part of this war. We're not doing anything there. And one argument could be because of Ben Gurion Airport, which is full of American aircraft. If you want to taxi, they're going to hit each and every one of those aircraft.

The other point would be how Israel is, you know, somehow the air defense system is not working. Last night, at the same time that we had this war, we had Lebanese rockets hitting targets in the southern part of Lebanon and in the northern part of Israel. And looking at the situation, Alex, do you think it's basically an American agenda, or is Israel forcing the United States? Because Israel had some sort of equation in the region — they wanted to attack each and every country without being attacked. Those days are gone. And I don't see the United States being capable of turning the situation around or getting it back to what it was before this war started.

I think that here we have a mystery of some sort, Nima, because it's very hard to explain how a small country in the Mediterranean can so completely control the military of the world's greatest superpower, how they can have so much influence. And then people will say, like, oh, well, yeah, but you know, like, Jewish donors have a lot of money. Okay, what are you saying? That the Chinese don't have a lot of money? That the Arabs don't have a lot of money? The Russians don't have a lot of money? A lot of actors in this world have a lot of money. So it's not money. It's something beyond that. And I think that there's some kind of an Anglo-Zionist conspiracy that has

very deep roots, that probably has been infiltrating and co-opting the United States' governing structures for decades now, probably since before Israel was even conceived.

We can even go to the creation of the Scofield Bible and the promotion of this new Christianity, which is completely alien to traditional Christianity — it's all about the rapture, all about biblical times, Armageddon, the second coming of Christ, and all this stuff. And so it appears that they have such influence that they've completely subverted American democracy. A case in point: last week's passage of the National Defense Authorization Act for 2027, which includes Section 224, which practically puts the whole US military, with its technologies, data, infrastructure — practically everything — completely at the disposal of Israel.

It effectively fuses the United States military with the Israeli military. The United States never had this kind of relationship with any other ally ever. So how can this possibly be? And then this morning, I'm watching a journalist going through the U.S. Congress. And so, the NDAA bill didn't pass yet. It passed through the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives. And then there's a process — it goes to the Senate, it'll be six months before it passes. But there's virtually no opposition. Ro Khanna proposed an amendment to strip out Section 224, and it was rejected. And then Thomas Massie said that he would propose an amendment to strip it out.

But again, we know that all these people are so completely on the hook to Israeli interests that at this point they're no longer even hiding it. So this morning I was watching a very recent video. A journalist goes to the House of Representatives, and he's asking all these congressmen and congresswomen, "United States first or Israel first?" And he must have asked at least a dozen of them as they're passing like this. Only one of them says, "United States first." All the others couldn't even say, "Of course, United States first. We are democratically elected representatives. We represent our constituents. This is what we're here for." Obvious thing. What's the stupid question for?

But no, none of them can bring themselves—well, one exception—to stand in front of a camera and say "America first." This is simply ridiculous, surreal. I'm amazed. I'm completely amazed. And so, obviously, you know, if they have sufficient influence to push this through the U.S. Congress, to basically introduce an Israeli Trojan horse into the American military structures, well, are they powerful enough then to push for a draft? To start recruiting American youth into the army to go and fight Iran for Israel? Volunteers are talking about this. Alex Karp has been talking about this.

Why is it so important to a private corporation to introduce the draft and to make sure that all the young men and women in the United States go to their military service so that they could then be sent over back to the Middle East to fight and die for Israel? We can't be sure that they are unable to do this anymore. And there's increasing talk about doing this. And there's an increasingly blatant, brazen commitment to Israel above everything else. We cannot explain this — like, a small little country there on the other side of the world that's completely dependent on U.S. financial aid, U.S. military aid, that without military support would basically disappear. How do we explain this?

And then you get the same from the UK. People in Britain are complaining that their political class is completely dominated by the Israelis, right? Same in Germany. Same in many places around the West. That's very, very difficult to explain. And I think that the only explanation, to my mind, that is consistent with the pattern of developments over the last decades, is that the conspiracy goes right back to the City of London, to where Israel was founded, right? And it goes right back to those vested interests who have decisive financial power over basically all of the Western world, because they control everybody's central banks. They control credit creation. They pick winners and losers. They decide who's going to be the oligarch. They decide who's going to control the media.

You know, Rupert Murdoch in the United States was, you know, like an obscure newsman in Australia. And now he becomes this big global king of news. Well, who made it possible for exactly that guy to become so dominant in the news media, you know, controlling Fox News and The Wall Street Journal and who knows what else? Well, it was the Rothschilds. It was them. And they are the ones who are basically the patron saints of the State of Israel and have been for over 100 years, right before Israel's creation. The Balfour Declaration was issued to Lord Walter Rothschild. And, you know, coincidence that when the war started on 28 March of this year, it was none other than Nathan Rothschild who was kind of gloating about it and saying, "Iran Revolution 2026, February 28th."

February 28th. What did I say? The war is March 28th. Oh, sorry, yeah, February.

So he rarely tweets, but he tweeted out, hashtag IranRevolution2026. And then his comment is, "History is written by the winners." What's it to him? Yeah.

I think just the way that they're talking about Section 224, which is merging the two militaries, the U. S. military with the Israeli one, and considering what Benjamin Netanyahu said on 60 Minutes, that they want to be independent of the United States, that's totally the opposite way. And it shows how this war has hit Israel militarily, in my opinion. That's why they're so desperate to do it as soon as possible, to merge the two militaries, because they know what's going on in the United States.

This huge dissatisfaction with the foreign policy of the United States among ordinary people in the United States. They say, no more wars. We are tired of these wars on behalf of Israel, to fight them. But they're trying to do it in Congress. They're trying to officialize that. And nobody can argue. And you're going to go against it? It's some sort of, you know, it's part of our policy. You know, it was voted in Congress and you cannot go against it. This is the move they're making right now. They want to trap the U.S. military forever.

Yes. Yes, exactly. Exactly. And, you know, the way it always works is that they pry the gates open a little bit, and then they push it all the way, because who's going to oppose them? You know, so, you know, this fight over Section 224 is going to go on in Congress for the next six months, and maybe, you know, depending on how the public reacts, maybe they'll put in some vague restrictions. Okay, well, but in the end, you know, like, you'll give them an inch, they're going to take two miles, and they're going to try to put themselves completely in control of the U.S. military in a way that's going to be extremely, extremely difficult to reverse.

And then, you know, even if Israel collapses, let's say, conceivably, well, they're doing all these really, really weird things with, you know, islands in Greece, Cyprus, Sazan Island in Albania, private cities across South America. Yeah, yeah, yeah, I mentioned Cyprus. These new private chartered city-states across South America, exclusive Jews-only zones in Ukraine. They're doing something really, really weird. And, oh, you know, again, we have this incredible coincidence that when Kushner and Ivanka Trump randomly discovered Sazan Island in Albania, which just so happens to be a strategic military outpost for control of the Otranto Gate.

You know, the Adriatic Sea cuts the deepest into the European continent, right? And it's also a very crucial trade and transport corridor into Europe. They randomly discovered this island when they were vacationing on whose boat? Well, that's again Nathan Rothschild. Amazing how he's everywhere. And so this is where I see the origin of all these wars, of this whole process, because there was also, you know, when the Ukraine war started, allegedly there was this letter, again from the same young man, to the members of Parliament in the UK, again telling them, you know, like, we have to do everything to make sure that we win this war against Russia in Ukraine.

So every time, there are rivers of blood flowing. You find the same name deeply involved. And then, you know, who was the—what name was the employer of Jeffrey Epstein? That would be, again, the same family name. So, you know, they have been at the pinnacle of power for more than 200 years now. They've cornered the monetary system, the credit creation system. They create the oligarchs. They buy the politicians. And I think that ultimately, it's not Trump. Trump is just doing his part. And what's different about Trump is that he's doing it in a way that's more brazen, more blatant, more vulgar, dumber, and so forth, but it's exactly the same policy that's been in place for decades.

You know, Iran has been on the kill list of these people since at least 2001, but we know that it's been since before. But after they kicked off the global war on terror, then they said seven countries in five years. Iran was the last on that list, which means that at least since 2001, they've been working. So that means Clinton—sorry, George W. Bush administration, Obama administration, Biden administration, Trump administration. Trump is the easiest to hate of all these people, but he didn't invent this policy. He's just carrying it out like everybody else, which means that the origin of the conspiracy is a level higher than where Trump is. Yeah.

Is this some sort of ilk that they are all connected, a network of people that are connected, mostly bankers? Or, you know, what is this? Is it more political? Is it more connected to the economy? Is it all together? What do we know about this network? Because you mentioned it goes from the United Kingdom, goes to the United States, it's all connected, then comes to Israel, the same people. And I'm asking, who are these people? What do we know about their agenda? What do we know about if they're more connected politically, economically, all these aspects together?

Well, they are clearly an occult oligarchy. Uh, they have been in charge of, uh, the affairs of humanity for an extremely long time. Uh, you know, they are in control of, for example, HSBC Bank, which was basically created to facilitate the opium wars against China, destroyed a major civilization. Uh, they ran India, right? Um, they have infiltrated the United States already 200 years ago, and they ran their banks. They created these boards of trade. They took charge of key U.S. cities and trade hubs, dominant in U.S. real estate, dominant in U.S. media, dominant in the military-industrial complex, energy production, steel production, and so forth.

And then they obviously, you know, by their politicians, over time, you know, they have been able to create barriers to insulate themselves so that they're not so visible, that their role is not so visible. So we see people like Bill Gates and Anthony Fauci, and we see Bill Ackman and Larry Ellison and George Soros and so forth, but we don't see beyond that. And then, of course, we see the politicians. But now we know that one of their executors, the managerial-class-level people, was Jeffrey Epstein. Where did Jeffrey Epstein come from? We know a lot about that—how he came, how he was introduced to Ghislaine Maxwell, and so forth. And we also know who employed him.

Ariane de Rothschild from Edmond de Rothschild and Company, which is in Geneva. And then somehow he's all very tight with Bill Gates. And he and Bill Gates write back and forth to each other, "How do we get rid of the poor people?" And then they planned the COVID pandemic in, you know, years in, I think, 2015 or before that. And so it's all, you know, like it's all somehow connected, but it all seems to lead to the same name. And then, you know, a lot of people who look into this, then they say like, no, no, no, if they're visible, it's not them. There must be a deeper, higher level. And I think that's not the case. And here's why I think that.

It's because whoever controls the intelligence agencies is at the top of the pyramid of the command-and-control hierarchy. Because once you control the intelligence agencies, then you're the one who can have people assassinated, have their children killed, kidnap, kneecap them, bribe them, blackmail them, and do whatever you want. Which means that even if there were somebody supposedly superior to you, senior, who had maybe more money or has been in the game longer,

well, you can now start brutalizing them as well and forcing them into subjugation. And it seems to me quite clear that it's the Rothschild family that ultimately controls the intelligence layer, the assassins, and the secret agents.

It's not even controversial that for all this time that they have been dominant in the world, they have had their own private intelligence agency. And that's where Jeffrey Epstein was working. He was cooperating closely with Mossad, and he had relationships with MI6 and the CIA and so forth. But at the core, there was this private intelligence agency. So anyway, you know, the reason why I wanted to lay all this out—the picture is vague, and obviously we can only, you know, with certain revelations from the Epstein file, pick out some dots which are now on the record. They're not in the realm of conspiracy theories anymore. But I think that a lot of people are too focused on Trump. And because Trump is so obnoxious and loud and vulgar, it almost seems like he's creating a whole huge mess out of everything.

But that's not the case. And not to defend him, but just not... Trump owns this, but he didn't define that policy. That policy was defined before he even entered politics. And so he's now been maneuvered into playing his part, whether they threatened him, whether they offered him some kind of a deal. I'm starting to think that he was offered some kind of a deal, that there would be this new government in Jerusalem, and maybe there would be a Pax Judaica, which would then be consistent with the Jewish eschatology. And that, you know, Kushner and Ivanka Trump would be very, very high-level new nobility for all the future. And, you know, maybe all this appeals to him and he's like, yeah, what the hell, you know, I'll go along with it. But it wasn't him who sat down and thought like, okay, how are we going to manage the world?

How are we going to manage the Middle East? Oh, I think we have to take down the Iranian regime. The Iranian regime was slated for takeover practically since 1979. They tried through proxy war, Saddam Hussein. They tried with sanctions. They surrounded Iran with military bases. They dragged them through all these negotiations. They kept moving the goalposts, and whatever concession Iran makes, then they ask for the next concession. And now I think they thought, we're going to do it like this—you know, color revolution, kind of like a Maidan-style thing, a little bit of bombing from outside to top it off—except it didn't work. So anyway, long rant, but the point is, Trump's easy to hate on, but he's not the moving principle behind this whole thing. It's higher than him. It's much higher than him.

But they have their hand on Russia's. They're handlers in the Trump administration who are controlling the whole situation with Trump.

Yes, yes. And they somehow managed to get rid of everybody else who doesn't agree. Tulsi's out. Joe Kent is out. Joe Kent has effectively, not officially, but effectively, been replaced with Sebastian Gorka. You know, arch-Zionist British asset. You know, a guy who is an arch-Zionist, but he's also an asset of the City of London. So it couldn't be more blatant. It's just, and I agree with you, Nima, that they must be really panicked because they're no longer even bothering to hide it.

By the way, looking at the situation that Israel is in, I don't know. The United States did everything with this war for Israel. What else do they want from the Middle East? And what else can they get from these sorts of wars? The reason that the United States is attacking Iran with this tit-for-tat is all because they're not capable of continuing the war the way it was during the 40 days of war. Because they're short of, you know, cruise missiles, they're short of interceptors. And Donald Trump is begging somehow. I don't know if you saw yesterday, he was begging that you have to produce more weapons, more missiles, more interceptors. As though if he orders that, he's going to get it. Because they are increasing the military budget in the United States, but that doesn't mean that you can get the weapons, because it takes time to produce them.

There's some estimation that maybe a decade, the United States needs more than 10 years to replace all those weapons or missiles that were used during the war — 40 days of war, by the way. And the assessment on their part, the American intelligence, said Iran at least has 70% of its arsenal. This is the end, I think, for Donald Trump. They don't need to go that far. And I don't know what is the meaning of what he's doing and the way that he's behaving right now with the market, the oil market. Right now, this trade is totally closed, which was supposed, you know, during the, it was somehow open because they were letting something like 30 tankers pass through the Strait of Hormuz each and every day. And that thing has just stopped. Nothing is passing right now. And is that going to help Donald Trump? No. But it seems Israel has the upper hand, and their upper hand is really the upper hand.

#Alex

Yes, exactly. And that is the mysterious part that I find so very difficult to explain. If you assume that we are living in liberal democracies where, you know, politicians have to respect the will of the people, of their voters, and if the voters said no more aid to Israel, then that's no more aid to Israel. If they say America first, America first, you know, they're spending what it is, between one and two billion a day on this war. Remember the Baltimore Bridge that was destroyed in, what was it, 2023 or so? They never rebuilt it. And now the plan is that it might get rebuilt by the end of 2029, maybe 2030. One bridge. How many bridges have the Chinese built in the last two years?

How many bridges have the Iranians built in the last few years? If you look at Azerbaijan, in the last five years, they built close to 150 bridges. They built 4,000 kilometers of highways. I don't know

how many tunnels, but dozens of tunnels. Anyway, you know, this is a choice for a society. Do you want to be an empire waging war everywhere around the world? Or do you want to build a prosperous society for your people at home, for your constituents? And it's very clear that the whole American system is choosing war and empire to the detriment of their people. And so that cannot be explained by legitimate structures of governance as though we're talking about a democracy, because it's obviously just a facade.

The facade is this shiny liberal democracy stuff, and everybody swears that they're so free, so free, the freest people in the history of the Milky Way Galaxy, right? But somehow they can't fix a bridge. Or they don't want to fix the bridge, but they do want to send billions, tens of billions of dollars of weapons, of financial support to Israel, to Ukraine, to Taiwan, to whoever is going to wage wars. \$40 billion to Javier Milei. Why? It was never adequately explained. Javier Milei needed a \$40 billion bailout. Trump and Scott Besson just gave it to him. No explanation to the American people. Hey, you know, maybe we could have used this \$40 billion for something at home.

Nope, it's going to Javier Milei. And so clearly everything is something else, and we need to explain it. What is it then? And I, you know, I end up always converging on this one place, which is the City of London, and one dominant influence there, which is this banking dynasty under the name of Rothschild, who also control, you know, in the United States, things like JP Morgan, and I don't know which other banks, probably Goldman Sachs and so forth and so forth. But that's all. I apologize, somebody's trying to call me. Anyway, you know, I think we have to connect dots, and we have to make guesses, and we have to deal with extremely vague things. Oh, God.

Is it your phone?

No, it's not. It's my aunt, who I told not to call me because I'm going to have an interview, but she obviously forgot. I'm going to punish her too.

Alex, I think what's important when it comes to the United States and their trying to control the universities in the United States, which is the main point there, is that, you know, they're trying to create new sorts of laws in the universities that you cannot criticize Israel. You cannot support Palestinians. You can do everything but that. This is some sort of new modern dictatorship that is shaping in the universities in the United States, which is huge in my opinion, looking at the scale and the way that they're trying to put pressure on big, prominent, and so important, famous universities

in the United States. I don't know what the damage can be, you know, how the people in the United States are perceiving that. But from the outside, from what I've been watching so far, that is a huge sort of pressure and huge sort of change that they're trying to impose on universities.

#Alex

Yes. But, you know, having grown up in the communist world, I can tell you that doesn't work. Because when I was a teenager, you know, we were obliged to take courses in Marxism. That was the official ideology of the nation. We were a socialist country. Socialism was supposed to be a transition period from capitalism. Then you have a transition period, which is socialism, and then you transition into communism, which is going to be full utopia. And some people believed in that, but most people didn't.

And then trying to force people to believe something, some ideology, some untouchable sacred cow that nobody can criticize, that nobody can question. It doesn't work. People don't just say, like, yes, sir, I will support Israel. I will hate the Palestinians. They all deserve to die. Israel has the right to defend herself and kill all the babies in the West Bank and Gaza and across Lebanon and wherever they feel threatened. And Israelis obviously feel threatened if anybody else breathes close to them. So they feel safe only when everybody else is dead.

It's like the old thing.

#Alex

You know, they create desolation and call it peace. That's the only peace that they could possibly recognize. So they will never stop. And then, you know, the idea that you're going to force people to just go along with it and to love Israel and to hate on everybody who is against Israel, it usually has the opposite effect, you know. So if you force me to believe in Marxism and to deny the evidence of my own eyes, well, then I'm not going to do that. Then I'm going to go and ask, like, why? Why can't I question this? And I remember very vividly when I was 16 and we had Marxism, and the whole class would debate the teacher because she would say, like, well, things are like this and like this and like that. And then, like, kids would go, like, well, no, it isn't really, because it seems to me that it's like this. And then, you know, what can they do?

They cannot call the police and say, like, take all these children to prison and arrest their parents, because then everybody would end up in prison. So they started debating us. And then the more they debated us, the more we converged on the reality that the kids were right and the professors were wrong. And even the professors themselves, they recognized it. When you don't have an argument, it's only so far that you can push it. And so that's going to blow back on them. And, you know, it was a few months ago that Larry Ellison bought TikTok. Did that help the image of Israel in

the United States? I don't think it did. It didn't do a damn thing. Maybe it only got worse. So that's the... you know, that's the sign of things to come, and they cannot reverse it. This is like a tsunami. You know, you can paddle it back all you want, but it's going to overwhelm you, and this is 100% coming.
