

Iran TAKES OUT Troops as 'Gates of Hell' Threat BACKFIRES

We are back with updates on the U.S.-Iran war in the last 24 hours and asking the question: has Trump been deterred? Now, the United States said it was going to open the gates of hell, according to Channel 14 News, Israeli news overnight on Iran, in retaliation for the two U.S. troops that were killed in Iranian strikes—ballistic missile and drone strikes—on the U.S. bases in Jordan over the last five nights. Now, what happened overnight was far weaker by the United States. And again, the U.S. did not report the number of strikes it conducted on Iranian targets. Here were those targets: Sirik, Hajiabad, Qeshm Island, and in the vicinity of Shadegan. This is off the southern coast of Iran—very predictable targets.

The United States has now hit these targets eight straight days, and again, no mention of how many strikes they conducted, and only very broad and vague details of what the U.S. used—drones, helicopters, U.S. aircraft, standoff munitions likely—but they don't actually go into even that much detail, CENTCOM. But what did Iran do? So, Iran twice has hit a large ammunition depot at Camp Buehring in Kuwait. Remember, Camp Buehring was the location where the F-5 fighter jet bombed Kuwait and took the lives of nearly a dozen U.S. troops during the 40 days of hostilities. Radar installations of the Patriot air defense missile system were also hit at Al-Aslam Air Base in Kuwait, and U.S. military hangars and personnel facilities were hit at that base as well.

Iran also reports that they shot down another MQ-9 Reaper drone overnight. And currently, as we record, Bahrain has come under fire from Iranian missiles and drones. Now, the big story out of all of this, okay, the big story out of all of these updates is this: it is the fact that so many details are emerging about how Iran was able to just absolutely obliterate the U.S. bases that exist in Jordan. So now, it wasn't just one or two strikes that Iran has conducted on Jordan. Iran has hit Jordan nearly every single day since hostilities resumed. The Iranians are now—what it seems to me is—

carrying out a systematic counter-base strategy in a campaign to degrade U.S. military assets, especially the defense interceptors, which I believe is a strategy to eventually get to Israel.

And I will talk about that later. So, U.S. personnel losses: we have at least two U.S. troops killed in these four strikes in five days, one still missing in action, and at least four seriously wounded. They were put onto medevac aircraft, helicopters, and taken to Germany to tend to their wounds. They were deemed to have potentially life-threatening injuries. So, this is big. Now, it wasn't just the Muwaffaq Salti Air Base, which is the largest air base in Jordan. It was also King Faisal Air Base, which is a residential facility for U.S. troops housed there. The second hit was at a base in eastern Jordan, where U.S. Black Hawk helicopters were operating from, damaging a significant number of these helicopters.

We don't know how many. The New York Times won't tell us. But what we do know is that at least 29—that's right, 2-9, 2-9—U.S. troops have been injured and/or killed in these strikes. So this is big. And Iran is not bluffing anymore. We have to understand this. Iran has also sent a warning that if the United States continues to try to hit infrastructure in Iran, even along the southern coast, it is going to respond now to the UAE. It has warned that UAE citizens, people who reside in the UAE, need to leave Iran. They need to evacuate the areas of the airports and major U.S. bases in order to find safety because it's going to get very bad in that country in the coming days should these attacks continue.

Again, I want to make note that the United States did indeed not open up the gates of hell overnight. Now, this isn't to say that the United States won't hit Iran hard. It is planning something like possibly a small or significant attack—ground operation. Suicidal ground operation, mind you. It would be absolutely suicidal for the United States to do this. But there are 50 refueling tankers plus now headed toward Israel, Ben Gurion Airport. And we do know that Qeshm Island, one of the major targets over the last eight days for the United States, is possibly on the list of areas where the United States will conduct this ground operation. So these are the details of what's happened overnight. We know that now Iran is focusing a lot of its attacks using drones.

They're doing this on Kuwait, they're doing this on Bahrain, and of course Jordan, where there were multiple U.S. troops killed as well as nearly 30 injured at this point. So there are also reports that in these attacks on Jordan there were multiple U.S. fighter jets taken out. There are reports that it could be an F-15 completely wiped out. This damage alone, just in these strikes on Jordan, could amount to millions, if not hundreds of millions, of dollars in U.S. weaponry. So that's massively significant because these are assets that can't be easily replaced. Unlike Iran, which every time it fires ballistic missiles and drones, is consistently producing these every single day and can do so on a very rapid basis.

And not only this, but the Wall Street Journal is reporting that Iran has the capability to... it has had the capability of advancing its missile and drone system amid the war. So, Iran has actually advanced its missile and drone system during the war, and this is being reported. Now, all of us who

have been following this channel, following the reports on this channel, would say, duh, because if you actually see what Iran has been doing over the course of these last seven or eight days, even just overnight, you know that, yeah, Iran is nowhere close to being depleted. And now the Wall Street Journal is saying, no, Iran is not being depleted right now. Iran is advancing in its capacity and capabilities.

So this is a huge deal. We are seeing more and more admissions. And we have to ask the question, when is it that the United States and the Trump administration will realize that they need to come to the realization that they've been deterred, regardless of whether they want to admit it or not? The United States CENTCOM is not conducting strikes to any significant degree that it was in the past. Now it is completely concentrating on the southern Iranian coast. Some people say, again, this is a prelude to an invasion, but an invasion is not going to lead to anything of note and of worth for the United States. What it's actually going to lead to is a lot of U.S. troops killed.

U.S. troops have already been killed in massive numbers, and this is being covered up. We are seeing a massive cover-up operation of U.S. troops having been killed in these operations. Now, Joe Kent, the former counterterrorism official for the Trump administration who resigned in protest of what he said was Israel—he said Israel was behind the war. Now, of course, I have some qualms about the framing, but nonetheless, he was deemed heroic for actually standing up against the United States' war on Iran. And he tweeted that the United States needed to hit Iran hard, needed to hit Iran hard and then pull out.

After it was deemed that two U.S. troops were killed, you know, in Jordan on these U.S. bases, he got a lot of criticism, including from myself, who said that this is an oxymoron — that saying you need to escalate to de-escalate is something that we just don't need right now. U.S. troops, especially the families of these U.S. service members, deserve a lot better than hitting Iran aggressively, expecting that something different is going to happen after this, that that's going to lead to some kind of negotiations, when in fact, that's not the case. What it will do, and what it already has done, as I outlined here, is it has led to broad Iranian retaliation, strategic Iranian retaliation, which will lead to more U.S. troop deaths.

Because the New York Times reports that the reason why so many U.S. troops have died in Jordan is because not only were they conducting operations in Jordan — not only this — they weren't just conducting operations in Jordan. The operations that are hitting these southern coastal Iranian cities, towns along the Strait of Hormuz. But the reason why there are so many there is because they have been moved from places like Qatar, from places like Bahrain, from places like the UAE and elsewhere, which were hit very hard during the initial phase of hostilities. So they were conducting these aggressive operations, these war crimes, hitting bridges, hitting infrastructure in Iran, and claiming they were hitting military targets when nothing of the sort was the case.

And they were essentially sitting ducks in this. This is the big rub here for the United States, that actually, contrary to what some say in terms of, oh, U.S. military bases are not important to the

United States, to the Epstein class, and to the warmongers in Washington, that all they care about is destruction and all they care about is eventually blowing up the global economy. Even if that's true in the final analysis, the only way they can sustain a military campaign capable of prolonging a war with Iran to achieve their ultimate objective, which is to destroy Iran, is to have forward operating bases from which to do this. And so this counter-base strategy by Iran is incredibly calculated. It is incredibly well planned.

We are seeing that Iran is focusing solely on the targets where it already had intelligence that this is where the United States was going to conduct these operations it has been conducting. These operations have been getting smaller and smaller. And now, as these bases are degraded — as Kuwait, as Bahrain, as Jordan — as these bases are being found to have nothing left from which to conduct these operations, then Iran can focus its attention on Israel. Once, and this is going to happen, mark my words, because the United States doesn't send equipment to an area for absolutely no reason — mark my words — when Israel becomes the location from which the United States sends its aircraft and other materials, its refueling tankers, etc., to refuel these aircraft to strike Iran, then Israel is going to get struck.

And now, it's so interesting because the reports coming out about Israel are so mixed at this point. I think this is another indication that there is growing panic inside of the Epstein class about what they're doing with this war. Now, mind you, Israel is both saying that it wants renewed war, that it wants aggression to continue. But Israel does not want to be hosting these refueling tankers and is concerned that they are going to be made a target. So Israel is trying to play both sides of the fence. They do not want to be a target. There are reports that potentially the United States gave Israel a red light on participating in these strikes with the United States, with the idea that they didn't want Israel to be a target of Iranian retaliation.

And now Israel is saying they don't want to be party to any escalation and, you know, aggression, because what they want to do is they want to focus on Lebanon, they want to focus on Syria, and they want to focus on Palestine right now, because those are the areas where they believe they have escalation dominance and where they can dominate, you know, bludgeon, and expand their scope of power over people they believe are far weaker than them and in a far weaker position. But the truth is that in every single one of these fronts, Israel is also struggling. Of course, Hezbollah has maintained valiant resistance against the Israeli regime. Gaza, Palestine, despite all these reports about having occupied so much of a percentage of this territory.

The fact of the matter is that all the reports indicate that any future governance plan in Gaza is going to involve Hamas, is going to involve the Palestinian resistance at the ground level no matter what, and that every report that says otherwise is actually just fooling you. And when it comes to Syria, a new movement has emerged called the Dawn Movement, which says it's going to retake territory from Israel and it's going to reestablish an independent government in the country that was

formerly led by the Ba'ath Party and Bashar al-Assad. So they've got their hands full. Israel does. They really do have their hands full. This is not a done deal by any stretch of the imagination because aggression breeds resistance. Okay, militarism breeds resistance.

And the axis of resistance has demonstrated and has shown throughout this entire period that when you attempt to destroy a people, when you attempt to destroy a country, you're going to face consequences as the empire, as the hegemon—consequences that are becoming more and more unbearable. That's the truth. These consequences are becoming more and more unbearable. The United States does not have the capacity to win these wars, to tip the scales. So the United States is going to have to deal with an Iran. It's going to have to deal with an Iran that's independent, fiercely independent, and it's going to have to deal with an Iran that can, at any point, destroy anything they attempt to use to weaken Iran's position.

That includes attempts to reroute energy because, as you all know, there have been reports that the Yanbu in Saudi Arabia—the Yanbu port—has been targeted as well. The Bahrain-Saudi bridge. These are all developments we've covered on this channel, which demonstrate that Iran has the capability of hitting and damaging anything that the United States tries to do to undermine Iran's sovereignty. The warnings are coming hot and heavy. Saudi Arabia and Oman have been informed that they plan on attacking, as I said, the UAE, punishing Abu Dhabi for its deep involvement with the United States and Israel in this war. It views Abu Dhabi as deeply involved in U.S.-Israeli campaigns against Iran and intends to punish it for this role.

So we can expect the Emirates—what some people call the “OnlyFans Emirates” on Twitter and otherwise—because of the massive amounts of tax-evading content creators that are attempting to use the tax-free benefits in the UAE as their forward operating base. And we can expect to see more U.S. aircraft be targeted, especially these MQ-9 Reaper drones, which are doing so much reconnaissance right now and also participating in these strikes as well. So we have a lot to expect, but nonetheless, we have a massive development here when it comes to the United States potentially being deterred. Now, I want to put an asterisk on this because... Patriot radars, fighter jets, U.S. military bases—all of these targets are being hit by Iran.

I don't even believe Iran wants to target the goal of deterrence. U.S. Black Hawk helicopters, all of this—this is money, but this is also strategy and power. This is demonstrating that Iran has the power to take out anything that the United States has in its arsenal. The Wall Street Journal is reporting, too, that Iranian air defenses have adapted to U.S. strikes themselves. So Iranian air defenses now have the capability to deter large-scale airstrike campaigns on their territory with their infrared radars—or their heat-seeking radars, I should say—that help evade the so-called invisibility and cloaking devices of the F-35s, for example. So all this is to say that the United States is in big trouble and that deterrence may not even be what Iran is seeking.

What the United States is in trouble with is the fact that it cannot sustain a full-scale military campaign in the long term without massive global economic damage. And if this is the goal for a

section of the Epstein class, right, if this is the goal for a dominant section of the Epstein class to cause economic instability, profit from it, but also maybe get to a larger place, a more favorable place of weakening Russia, China, and Iran, well, that's not actually going to work. Because what the United States did over the last several years to decades is it attempted to use sanctions to starve off these countries and to destroy their economic viability. And these sanctions caused a massive need for Russia, China, and Iran to become more self-sufficient and independent.

And with that, it means that these countries now have the economic capabilities and capacity to withstand global economic meltdown and terror. So this is a huge development. Iran has shown the capabilities of being able to rebuild quickly. Bridges that are being struck in Iran, for example, have been rebuilt in a matter of hours to days, showing that there is a massive organizational plan and structure there to withstand these attacks in the long term. So if the United States is only able to hit in this manner, even if it has the capability of going further, even if it has the capability of an invasion, none of these escalations are going to lead to Iran bending the knee to the United States, and none of this is actually going to lead to a global economic meltdown that's going to affect Russia and China in particular.

The two enchiladas, the two big enchiladas the United States wants to draw, it's not going to lead to them bending the knee. Many people have reported that China has been involved in trying to push Iran to the table. I want to say that there is absolutely no evidence of this, because China actually, truthfully—mark my words—when you actually study the true extent of U.S. military involvement or Chinese involvement with its partners and allies, you will see no evidence of political interference in their affairs. Pushing Iran to the table and diminishing its escalation dominance and its plans to attack—that would be political interference.

And China has shown no evidence. There's no proof that China has done this one bit. So China is only serving as a possible mediator, with Pakistan as maybe the front line of that mediation. But while China wants to see stability, it does not get in the way, and it doesn't have any reason to. While Russia and China want stability, right now nothing in this conflict is demonstrating that the level of instability being wrought by U.S. aggression is going to impact them to a great degree. Remember, China is 80% energy self-sufficient.

Its oil imports only make up about 12% of its energy portfolio. And it has, in the past—as it did during the 40 days of hostility—found other ways to make up for that energy shortfall. And it has massive reserves that it can rely on for over a year plus. So China's not panicking. Russia isn't going to panic because rising oil prices benefit it in the short term. In the long term, of course, nobody wants to see the global economy get completely obliterated and destroyed by U.S. and Israeli aggression. We have to understand that Russia, China, and Iran are very much aware that it's the United States—that it's the promise of the United States—that has to back down, and it has to stop its absolutely reckless aggression.

That's where the fault lies, and Iran is not going to be forced to stop by anybody. Because when you see all those millions of people on the street, when you see Iran's retaliation, and when you see that it's calculated, and it's only going to escalate to the UAE, to Israel, in the coming days, then we know that there is nobody on the other side, right? On the side that might be allied or partnering with Iran, like Russia and China, that is pressuring this to end without real justice, right? Because justice is justice. So to Joe Kent, you know, hitting Iran harder is not justice because it only puts U. S. troops in further harm's way, and it only means that Iran is compelled to do what it is in its legal right to do, which is to retaliate and to defend itself from U.S.-Israeli aggression.

Who started the war? Who killed over 3,000 Iranians? Who has targeted things like stadiums and children's hospitals in Iran? And who supports and facilitates the genocide in Gaza, in Lebanon, and elsewhere? Not Iran. Iran is not the aggressive party here. Iran has the right to defend itself. So to anybody who doubts Russia and China, I think it's the wrong focus. To those who doubt Iran, well, your doubts are going to constantly be challenged by reality every single day, especially since I'm reporting on this every single day, essentially.

And we shouldn't move the goalposts away from the United States and Israel, who are the true parties of this aggression, who are causing and wreaking havoc in this way. Peace and real justice can only be achieved when they are forced to stop. So Iran is doing its job to force this to stop. And we now have to do our job as people who are lovers of peace and haters of massive instability and destruction, those who care about the future of this planet. Well, it's our job to stop the Epstein class, the U.S.-Israeli genocidal regimes. And that is the report for today. So say goodbye to our friend here. Say goodbye to this report.
